Garden View Apartments—Topping Off Ceremony

On Friday, November 18th, contractor Gulf Keystar, A Florida Joint Venture, LLC hosted a "topping off" ceremony at the site of the under-construction Garden View Apartments - a brand new 103-unit deed-restricted affordable workforce housing development owned by the Key West Housing Authority (KWHA). The event was held in honor of the subcontractors and their employees, thanking them for all their hard work.

At the time of the ceremony, construction of the residential property was over 70-percent complete, and the KWHA expects to begin leasing units during Spring of 2023. Ninety-two of the units will be rented to households with a maximum income of 80-percent AMI, and the remaining eleven units will be rented to households with a maximum income of 25-percent AMI. Attendees included the contractor's staff, employees of the subcontractors, KWHA Board Commissioners and staff, and local government leaders.

HISTORICAL REMEMBRANCE—October 15, 1999

In 1999, the Miami Herald newspaper reported on the beginning of the development of the Harry L. Bethel Roosevelt Gardens Apartments, a KWHA-owned property comprised of 96 deed restricted affordable 1, 2, & 3-bedroom apartments constructed in 2004.

Affordable housing planned for fairgrounds

Monroe County commissioners, acting as the Land Authority on acting as the Land Autority on Thursday gave the fairgrounds prop-erty on North Roosevelt Boulevard to the Key West Housing Authority. The Housing Authority plans to build about 100 rental units on the

land, next to the Salt Run Channel. The units will be permanently affordable, with rent determined by income

Development cost is estimated at

\$10 million to \$12 million. County commissioners delayed

until January consideration of a plan to change the way taxes are collected to fund the Monroe County Sheriff's Office. Everyone in the county now pays

the same taxes for the sheriff's office. But Key West has its own police department, which handles most local

policing functions The commission is set to consider splitting up the tax burden so those in unincorporated areas, where sheriff's deputies provide all local policing, would pay more. Because of the approach of Hurri-

cane Irene, commissioners also put off re-consideration of the controversial ban on vacation rentals

That will be rescheduled for a spe-cial meeting, to be held in Marathon or Key West. No date was set on Thursday.

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The holidays are a time for celebration and togetherness, and it warms my heart to see tenants' decorations on their patios and balconies. This is not a time to think about something as scary as a home fire, but don't let your guard down just because it's a festive time of year.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, nearly 800 fires are caused every year by Christmas lights. One of the causes is triggered by "daisy-chaining" extension cords. This is when one extension cord is plugged into another extension cord. This is very dangerous—extension cords are not designed to work with other extension cords. Another cause of fire is overloading extension cords. Although an average extension cord has 5 or 6 outlets, its best to use only about half of the outlets. You never want to create a power overload which can cause sparks. Lastly, don't affix lights using staples or nails. You might damage the wiring, which can cause electrical shock or fire.

The holidays should be merry and bright. An ounce of prevention will allow us to protect our homes and keep our loved ones safe while also enjoying the holiday decorations.



- A white picket fence was installed around the entire perimeter of Robert Gabriel Site A.
- Staff opened the wait list for the Garden View Apartments.
- The KWHA hosted two Resident Meetings—one at the Senior Citizen Plaza and one at the Lang Milian Apartments. Attendees and staff were able to discuss many topics, including recent site improvements, plans for the future, and resident services. New staff and new residents were introduced and scores of comment cards were collected for staff to review and strategize solutions to the residents' recommendations.
- A concrete spalling repair and new balcony railings project was completed
- on a section of the 5-story building at the Senior Citizen Plaza.
- Staff served a traditional Cuban pork Christmas dinner to the residents of SCP. The dinner was well attended, and even Santa Clause showed up!
- The Board of Commissioners approved the FY 2023 budget, which includes line items for several major improvement projects.
